HD and Martha grew up in central Texas, HD attending school in Rockdale and Martha in Cameron. Their fathers worked in the same Milam County courthouse, HD's father as superintendent of schools and Martha's as county sheriff. Her family home was the bottom portion of the jail, prisoners housed upstairs. The building is now a museum. Some prisoners were town drunks, others there for more serious reasons, though occasionally trusted downstairs for painting and other projects. Not surprisingly, Martha has lots of stories to tell about that portion of her life.


HD loves to say it took him nine years to get through college at Texas A&M to Martha's three at Baylor. He got a bachelor's degree in agriculture, later a bachelor's and master's in petroleum engineering. There was a two-year interruption for active duty military service during the Korean War; fortunately, he was sent to Germany. Martha majored in math. During summers, she added a master's in education and began teaching, first in her hometown, then Austin (seeking wider horizons) and (further still) a year at the US Air Force school in Morocco.

In 1958, the couple married in Cameron Presbyterian Church, beginning 64 years of marriage. HD was brought up in the Christian Church (with its Presbyterian roots), and the couple have remained Presbyterian or members of a reformed church. Both of them are music lovers, Martha enjoying piano for many years. They've always joined choirs, as well as serving as deacons and elders, HD once attending General Assembly in Montreat. When First Presbyterian Kerrville built its new sanctuary, HD served on the building committee. He, Martha and then-organist Terri Henneke were very involved in selection of the Jehmlich organ from Dresden, Germany.
